

Scholarship Awards Available

S tudents, Take Note: The Willamette Valley Chapter will once again be offering scholarship awards for 3rd year students who will be enrolling in plant systematics or plant ecology at a State of Oregon college or university for the 2007–2008 school year. The Jean Davis Memorial Scholarship Fund will award \$1,000 to the selected student. In addition, I am pleased to announce that, starting this year, an additional scholarship award is available! Due to the generous bequest from the estate of Augusta Rockafellar, an additional student will be awarded \$1,000 from the Augusta Rockafellar Memorial Scholarship Fund.

The rules for both scholarships are identical, and therefore, only one application is necessary to be eligible for either scholarship award. However, only one award will be given to any one candidate. That means two recipients for the 2007–2008 school year. Applications will be accepted by mail until May 1, 2007. Don't let this opportunity pass you by!

Rules For Scholarship Awards

- Scholarships are available to students in Oregon colleges, planning their major study in plant systematics or plant ecology.
- Scholarships are awarded in the amount of \$1000 to worthy students who will complete at least two years of satisfactory college work by July 1 of the year of receipt of application and are full time students. Graduate students may be eligible if they meet all qualifications except that of full time student.
- 3) Awards are made in the following manner:
 - a) A certificate is presented to the recipient.
 - b) A check in the amount of the award is submitted to the school of choice, as set forth in rule 1, to be used toward tuition within the following academic year.
- 4) If an award recipient fails to enroll, changes his or her major, or leaves the school before completing the period for which the award was granted, the full amount or unused

part of the money shall be returned to the Memorial Scholarship Fund.

- 5) Applicants are required to submit:
 - a) In their own words, a statement of academic and career intent.
 - b) Two letters of reference from persons able to judge the student's ability to successfully complete study in the area of plant systematics or plant ecology.
 - c) Full academic record (transcript).
- 6) The Scholarship Committee Chair must receive all applications, together with items listed in rule 5, no later than May 1. The award will be made by June 1.
- 7) Scholarships cannot be granted to Scholarship Committee members or their relatives.



New Conservaton Chair(s) Needed

N PSO seeks a person or persons to serve as conservation chairs. Statewide conservation tasks have traditionally been divided into Eastside and Westside Conservation Chairs to reduce the magnitude of the job and to enable chairs to have greater familiarity with issues.

The basic tasks of a Conservation chair are to identify issues of statewide importance, respond by letter to appropriate agencies, and to write short summaries of issues for the *Bulletin*. Other committees address threatened and endangered plants and legislative proposals. Conservation chairs are appointed by the state president and report to the Board of Directors. Job Announcement: Seasonal Plant Conservation Field Assistants Needed!

The Oregon Department of Agriculture's Native Plant Conservation Program has several openings this spring/summer for field assistants with an interest in rare plants and conducting research, an ability to pay attention to detail, and a desire to work outside and travel around the state. These are temporary full-time positions. One position starts in the beginning of April of 2007, with an expected duration of 6 months. The second position starts in the beginning of May of 2007, with an expected duration of 4 months. The position pays \$2119/month (\$12.22/ hour) and travel expenses are reimbursed.

The people in these positions will assist in the implementation and monitoring of research projects focused on increasing available knowledge of the biology, ecology and conservation of Oregon's rare and endangered plant species. These are great positions for someone with at least two years of college (15 quarter hours in a biological science), basic computer skills, a driver's license and good driving record, and an ability to work both independently and as a team member. A background in biological sciences and a familiarity with Oregon native plants and field research is a plus.

This position involves a lot of time working in the field, either with one other person or in small groups, in remote areas for up to 4-5 days at a time. This position requires frequent overnight travel and long drives to locations throughout the state. Some camping may be involved. Outside work will be performed in all weather conditions. Some hiking, lifting and carrying of field equipment and supplies, and physical work will be required.

All NPSO field trips are open to the public at no charge (other than contribution to carpool driver) and newcomers and visitors are always welcome. National Forests require a Northwest Forest Pass for many field trip locations. Permits can be acquired at forest headquarters and ranger districts.
