# Willamette Valley Chapter Scholarships Available

The Willamette Valley Chapter is offering \$1,000 scholarships for sophomores, juniors, and seniors enrolled at an Oregon college and university for the 2020-2021 school year and who are majoring in one of the following fields of study:

- botany;
- horticulture with a focus on native plants;
- any biological, environmental, or natural resource science with a botany emphasis or;
- any biological, environmental, or natural resource science combined with a
  demonstrated intent to pursue studies or a career in a plant-based field focused
  on or related to native plants (e.g. ecology, systematics, sustainable natural
  resource management, conservation biology).

Half-time students are eligible.

A limited number of qualified applicants will be selected to receive \$1,000 from either the Augusta Rockafellar Memorial Scholarship Fund or the Jean Davis Memorial Scholarship fund. Applications will be accepted by mail or electronically until June 1, 2020.

Applicants are required to submit:

- Name, address, email address, phone number, college/university name, and college/university address;
- A statement of academic and career intent, with a discussion of relevant coursework, extracurricular activities, and interests. Student's statement should show a demonstrated interest in native plants and the intent to pursue studies or careers related to native plants;

- Two letters of reference from persons able to judge the student's ability to successfully complete study in the student's area of major study.
- Full collegiate academic record (transcript).

## Remembering Larry Scofield

Larry R. Scofield: Falls City, OR Oct 22, 1936 - Nov 5, 2019

Larry Rex Scofield of Falls City passed away at the age of 83 on November 5 at home on his farm. Born in Portland, he was the son of the late Rex and Ruth Scofield. Larry graduated Roseburg High, attended La Sierra University in California and then joined the Coast Guard. He participated in whale and bird surveys and studies in the Arctic Ocean. He went on to obtain his master's degree at the University of Massachusetts in wildlife biology. After working six years for the State of Massachusetts Fisheries Department, he returned to Oregon on the west coast and bought himself a small farm in Falls City.

Larry had a passion for ecology and the environment. He enjoyed wildlife, botany, and birding. Larry was a Botanist at the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Salem District from 1977 - 1999. He vigilantly protected rare plants and their habitats and enhanced our knowledge of them by promoting inventory, monitoring, and research. He helped save three wild and scenic rivers, one wilderness area, and the Columbia Gorge National Scenic area. We can thank Larry for the existence of 25 Areas of Critical Environmental Concern and Research Natural Areas, most notably Valley of the Giants, Sandy River Gorge, and Mary's Peak. Members of the Native Plant Society of Oregon have enjoyed many field trips to these places with Larry.

Another legacy of his accomplishments is his tutelage of many aspiring botanists whom

he took under his wing as volunteers, interns, and seasonal botanists. Many of these established careers as botanists in BLM, US Forest Service, and state agencies, carrying on Larry's spirit of conservation across Oregon and Washington.

Larry is survived by his wife, Ruth Knobloch Scofield, brother Dr. Melvin Livingood, Mesquite, NV, sister Carolyn Scofield, Vancouver, WA, sister, Sharon Davis, Gladstone, OR, daughter Lucinda Holzman, son Bryan Scofield, daughter Heather Merrill, daughter Stephanie Crary and 17 grandchildren.

Workshop: Grass Identification

Cindy Roche and Christine Ott-Hopkins will teach a workshop as a fundraiser for the High Desert Chapter and the COCC Herbarium Endowment. It will be held in the COCC Science Building, 1027 NW Trenton Ave, Bend. Program: Shiny Geranium: A highly aggressive invasive plant threatens the biodiversity of the Klamath-Siskiyou Ecoregion

BLM botanist Cecile Shohet will present on a new noxious weed in SW Oregon, shiny geranium (*Geranium lucidum*). In her own words:

"I first encountered Shiny Geranium in a conifer/hardwood forest in the Upper Applegate Watershed. Alarmed would be sugar coating my reaction. This isn't the Willamette Valley or the Olympics. The Klamath-Siskiyou Bioregion doesn't have naturalized annual geraniums which dominate the herbaceous layer in our closed canopy native forests. Now we do. Is it possible to control this species, eradicate it from high priority sites, and keep it from naturalizing?" Come learn about the physiology, taxonomy, and ecology of Shiny Geranium. Discuss possible treatment methods. Find out its current range in the Rogue Valley and learn how to play a role in reporting new sites of this early detection-rapid response invasive. This is an opportunity to become involved in the Shiny Geranium Working Group. Consider playing a role in a committed educated community effort in the

conservation of native flora. Location: Southern Oregon University Science Building, Room 161. Free and open to the public.

#### Thursday, February 20th, 7:00 p.m.

#### Program: The Land Steward & Oregon Master Naturalist Programs

Join botanist and OSU faculty Rachel Werling for a taste of two engaging learning opportunities offered through OSU's Southern Oregon Research and Extension Center (SOREC). The Land Steward and Oregon Master Naturalists (OMN) programs are both dynamic field-based courses dedicated to improving stewardship of our region. Both are volunteer programs. The Master Naturalist program has two parts. The nine-week online course is an overview of the state's ecology. The field requirement of the course is one of several ecoregion offerings across the state. Our own Klamath-Siskiyou ecoregion course is an inspiring and educational 7-day journey with regional experts exploring the natural history and ecology of our diverse Klamath-Siskiyous. The six field days take place over two long weekends and cover geology, oak habitats and Traditional Ecological Knowledge, serpentine habitats, watersheds, montane habitat, and the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument. The Land Steward training takes place over 11 weeks in the fall. This program focuses on how to care for the land you live on. Eight field days take participants to local properties with experienced land owners and natural resource experts showcasing management practices around forest health, fire preparedness, streams, wildlife habitat, pastures, soils, rural economics, and infrastructure. Location: Southern Oregon University Building, Room 161. Free and open to the public.

#### Program: Public Land Grazing in the Siskiyou Mountains

Siskiyou Chapter Conservation Chair, Suzie Savoie, will give a presentation about public land grazing in the Siskiyou Mountains. Through maps and photos, she will provide information about the different grazing allotments on Forest Service and BLM land, and highlight the ecological concerns and associated impacts to native plant communities within the various allotments. Many grazing allotments in the Siskiyou Mountains encompass officially designated Botanical Areas with rare and endemic plants or unique and intact native plant communities. Public land grazing allotments can impact hydrology, fisheries, pollinator habitat, recreation and more. Suzie will discuss the environmental analysis and management changes needed to protect native plant communities and prevent ecological and recreational impacts from public land grazing allotments in the Siskiyou Mountains.
